Markas has also managed finance and operations at several other companies and non-profits, including the Los Angeles County Museum of Art and the architecture firm Thomas Phifer & Partners. Her current pro bono work includes service on her local community board in New York City.

"Jennifer's passion for women's issues coupled with an understanding of the jewelry and design industries uniquely prepares her to support our members and partners and lead WJA's efforts to advance equality and diversity in the fine jewelry and watch industries," says Luker.

Markas has a Bachelor of Science degree in business management-finance from Boston University, and a Master of Arts in decorative arts and design history from Parsons School of Design at The New School in New York City.
